Tomatoes - grading & sales in progress





An average income of US\$135 was generated per household through tomato sales, strengthening social safety and economic status of households through sustainable income from garden produce. Market linkages played a pivotal role in this agro income generating project.

Second Crop Selection

The project has linked effectively with local markets for leaf vegetables including rape and covo. Farmers now developed a system where by their crop rotation ensures that rape is readily available for neighbouring villages and local boarding schools markets.





Butternut crop during first week (1) and fourth week (2)



The project introduced butternut as a new crop requested by farmers in the community garden. Sales from previous harvest, demand and household food security contribution from the first crop led to the continued production of butternut in the community garden.





Internal Savings & Lending

Pandehuni Village Savings Group and their records





Part of the internal savings and lending groups trained under the project as an exit and sustainability strategy. These women pay a monthly savings subscription to develop group funds which grow through regular savings and interest generated from group loans. The fund covers social as well as capital needs for women led rural income generating activities.
