

EDITORIAL

Last August, ZUPA in Sizinda ward, in Bulawayo, celebrated 101 years of uGogo umaNdlovu's life. She told of how life had changed over the years and thanked ZUPA for the assistance extended to her in food handouts.

This week, we were touched and saddened by her passing. Rest in peace gogo. In her memory, we will continue our work of assisting and protecting the rights of pensioners and elderly people in Zimbabwe.

This week, the ZUPA team has been busy engaging the communities and potential investors on their views on the indigenisation and empowerment programme. The feedback has been that foreign investors and many ordinary people view Zimbabwe's indigenisation programme as highly politicised with parties in the Government of National Unity appearing to sit on different sides of the island on how it should be implement, if at all.

ZUPA is encouraging the Government of Zimbabwe to facilitate a mature and inclusive debate on indigenisation in Zimbabwe in a way that takes a leaf from resource economies like Australia, Saudi Arabia and Norway.

ZUPA is also calling on total depoliticisation of the programme to enable all Zimbabweans to participate and to give confidence to investors.

We call through the ZUPA presidential weekly, for a public information portal in libraries across the country to enable ordinary people to access all the information necessary for participation.

We are humbled by the support that the unemployed people of Zimbabwe continue to get through ZUPA.

WEEKLY ACTIVITIES

Education and Welfare

We are continuing our engagement with authorities on the issue of school fees for all children whose parents and guardians are unemployed and have no source of income.

ZUPA is in the process of compiling lists of these children in wards. As required, we will be engaging traditional chiefs, councillors and Members of Parliament in the areas where the children are for vetting and verification of the database before submitting to the Ministries of Education and Social Welfare.

ZUPA is prepared to go through whatever bureaucratic system in place to achieve social justice for the children of Zimbabwe.

Distressed Industrial and Marginalised Areas Fund

ZUPA has organised a roundtable meeting set for Monday 13th February at the ZNCC Bulawayo. We have invited business people, residents and the Ministry of Industry and Commerce to discuss matters arising from the use of \$40 million that has been released by the Ministry to help the industry in Bulawayo to recover. There are serious concerns.

We are sadly still waiting for the ministry to publish the names of the companies they shortlisted so that we can monitor their compliance with the terms of the bailout and hold them to account. We also want our unemployed members in Bulawayo to go and get the jobs expected to be created through this bailout.

Child rights

This week, Thamsanqa Zhou Jr raised serious issues about children who are being incarcerated with their breastfeeding mothers in Zimbabwe's health hazard prisons. We believe the social services and the justice ministry must take immediate action to address this serious issue.

Civil servants' Strike

We noted the civil servants strike and negotiations continue to drag on with no side willing to compromise. We also note that due to the nature of the education crisis, some teachers have crossed the picket line arguing that what they are now doing is charitable in the best interest of the children.

We encourage Government and the Apex Council Leaders to continue on a mature line and resolve the issue amicable.

We also encourage unions in Zimbabwe to look at ZUPA's set up where members are balloted before industrial action is taken. This will ensure that whatever they are doing is fully informed by the expressed views of the members. This would minimise the risk of civil servants who go on strike from being victimised by their managers as was the case in many areas. Strike action should be supported by evidence of a ballot of the members.

Strategy

As the demand for our work increases, we continue to add structures and add personnel. ZUPA is from next week starting Monday Lunch Forum in a number of cities to enable Zimbabweans to share ideas on employment creation, social and economic policies. We seek partners who can provide free venues during lunch (13:00-14:00 hrs) in Zimbabwean towns.

International Engagement

The ZUPA team is working to establish partnerships with unions and international agencies whose constitutional objectives are to alleviate poverty, development and create employment for people.

We will soon launch a campaign to mobilise resources for \$150 Million ZUPA Fund where half of the money would be used as security to enable unemployed Zimbabweans to access lines of credit for business start-up and half will be used as grants for viable income generating projects with prospects of creating employment.

PROVINCES

Mashonaland (Chairperson Milka Manyanda)

The ZUPA team in Mashonaland is planning a clean up programme in Murewa, where 29 rural wards will send volunteers to clean streets and the local hospital.

ZUPA believes this clean up is important in the wake of typhoid outbreak in Harare and the cholera outbreak not so long ago.

ZUPA Mashonaland would be happy to get any assistance in the form of T-shirts and refreshments for volunteers. We will also be happy is other organisations and Ministry of Health officials send volunteers in the proactive interest, health and safety of the residents of Murewa.

Ward councils will be reporting on their own consultations with grassroots on thematic issues every week. This week, ZUPA is focusing on the DIMAF project where the Ministry of Industry and Commerce shortlisted 58 companies to share \$40 Million in Bulawayo. ZUPA wants Bulawayo residents to participate in decisions on this project.

Midlands (Chairperson Pastor Manjoro)

ZUPA Midlands has engaged Ministry of Agriculture's Livestock Department to explore projects for ZUPA members.

We believe fishing, poultry, piggery and dairy farming are crucial for Zimbabwe's food security. We also believe there is demand in international markets for Zimbabwean products in this area. Our work will create jobs for our members and grow the economy.

We are at an advanced stage of organising a fishery educational tour and feasibility study for fish farming in the Zambezi.

We are in discussions with poultry commercial producers on a scheme that will enable ZUPA Midlands to supply at least three major producers. We are hopeful that this will go a long way to promote our work and alleviate our members' poverty.

ZUPA Midlands has formed a specialist committee to look at how people in the Midlands province can participate in mining in the province. We will soon be discussing with companies based in the province. We seek to promote mining and secondary industries in the midlands to ensure that our members get jobs and opportunities.

We are excited with the encouraging response from the commercial banks who are willing to consider our proposals for lines of credit. We now hope that the ZUPA national office can look into the request for a ZUPA business Fund that can work as collateral security for unemployed people to get access to loans.
